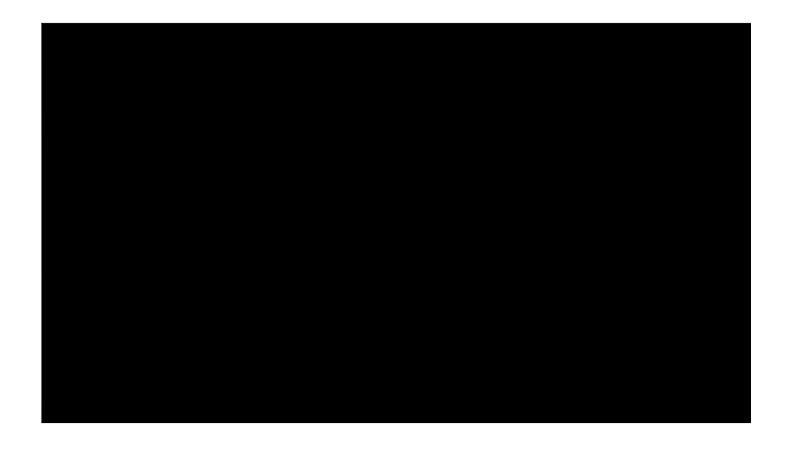

HOW WE FOCUS ON EVALUATION USE

- Talk about evaluation use at the beginning Who, What, How, Why - and put it in writing
- 2. Teach about evaluation as you are conducting the evaluation
- 3. Involve key stakeholders in meaningful ways
- 4. Share results often and in different ways
- 5. **Make evaluation fun** if you have fun with it, then the likelihood of use increases

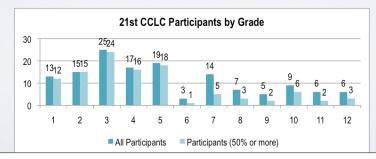

SHARE FINDINGS ACROSS SITES

Observations: Most Positive

- Youth generally interact with one another in positive ways.
- Staff treat youth with respect and listen to what they say.
- There is opportunity for unstructured time for socialization.
- Staff regularly reward youth achievements and positive behaviors, particularly in front of their peers.

Observations: Most Challenging

- Fun instructional materials and strategies are widely available.
- There is enough room for all program activities.
- Youth show respect for each other.
- There are no observable safety hazards in the program space.

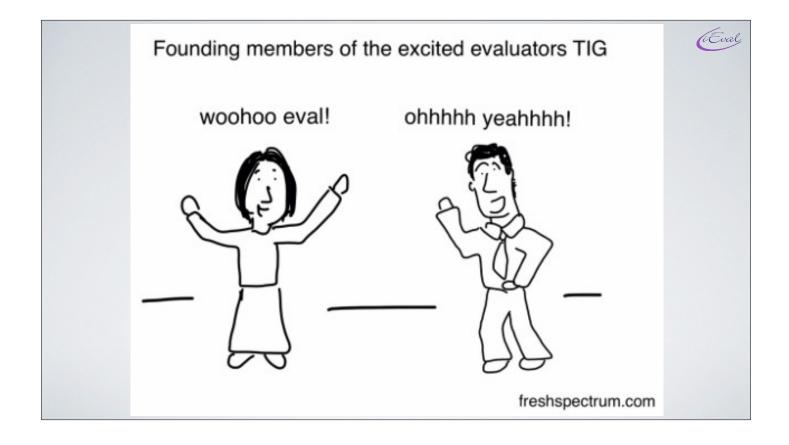

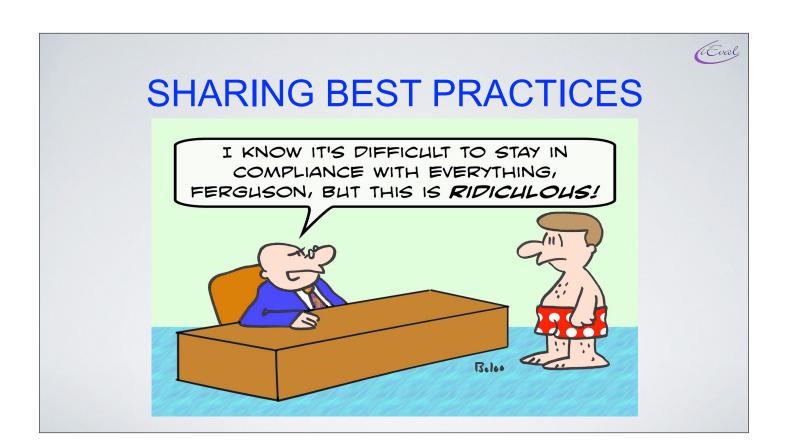


SHARING ACROSS PROGRAMS

What Characterizes a High-Quality Activity?

- They exhibit well-integrated academic content.
- They develop strong relationships between the participants and caring adults, older students, or peers
- They provide opportunities for authentic decisionmaking by the participants.
- They allow the potential for student leadership in the activity.

Homework Folders Each school day teacher receives folder Left side has work to be done Right side has completed work with "SPARKS" stamped on it Holds students accountable to homework Homework all in one place and by grade for teachers, students, & parents
